SEPTEMBER PROGRAM

Mr. John Slate, City of Dallas Archivist

"Dealey Plaza and the Triple Underpass - Building the Front Door to Dallas"

Slate will share in-depth history about Dealey plaza, where President John F Kennedy was assassinated nearly 50 years ago, and sign copies of his new book, "Dealey Plaza" co-authored by Dallas Park Director Willis Winters. Slate also published "Historic Dallas Parks"

Dealey Plaza is a 3.07 acre park in downtown Dallas, Texas, known both as the site of the founding of Dallas in 1841 and also the site of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy on November 11, 1963. In 1841 frontiersman John Neeley Bryan built a log cabin on the site, on a bluff overlooking the Trinity River. The bluff was later altered in 1928 through subsequent landscaping and flood control improvements of the Trinity River by the United States Army Corps of Engineers and other entities. The area was further developed as "The Front Door of Dallas" between 1935-1942 as a vehicular park and a triple underpass constructed in part by workers from the federally-sponsored Works Progress Administration and the National Youth Administration. Until the development of Dallas' highway system, Dealey Plaza served as the major gateway to the city from the west. In 1963 President Kennedy was assassinated in the heart of the Plaza. In 1993 the United States Department of the Interior designated Dealey Plaza a National Historic Landmark District.



**The 15th Annual *Legacies* History Conference

Those attending the 15th Annual Legacies Dallas History Conference on Saturday, January 25, 2014, will have an opportunity to visit a building not easily accessible to the general public—the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas, just north of downtown. The Dallas Fed invited the history conference to meet there in honor of the 100th anniversary of the Federal Reserve System.

The steering committee for the conference has announced the program for the event, whose theme is “The Unusual Side of Dallas: Unique Personalities, Impossible Dreams, and Unexpected Landmarks.” Speakers and topics will include: Adrienne Caughfield, “General Edwin A. Walker”; Jane Lenz Elder, “Virginia K. Johnson and the Dallas Rescue Home for ‘Erring’ Women, 1893-1941”; Evelyn Montgomery, “Neighborhood Heroes of the Cedars”; Cynthia Schearer, “Cosette Faust Newton’s Garden Ship of Dreams”; and Princeton Williams, “How Dallas Became a Federal Reserve Regional Headquarters.”

Following registration and morning refreshments beginning at 8 a.m., the conference will run from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The Dallas County Pioneer Association is a sponsor of the history conference, along with eleven other local historical organizations and libraries. Cemetery News

A neighbor in Forest Hills has volunteered to go to work on the Ferris Cemetery. Warren Ferris was the surveyor for Dallas County in the 1840s and along with others surveyed many other counties in our area of Texas. He chose the corner of San Leandro and St. Francis for this site. This is in Forest Hills. If anyone feels bored sitting at home I am sure this volunteer would appreciate help. There is a Texas Historical Marker still standing, but vandals have hauled off or destroyed all but one head stone. One of the lost ones is behind the fence in a nearby residence - she says it is safer there than at the site. At least we know where it is.

Ever since last winter the month long labor (\$4000.00) at the Horton Cemetery in Arcadia Park that allowed us to see the headstones for the Hortons, one of the first families to come to the Three Forks of the Trinity is still in limbo. I hope the money will not be wasted. This site is surrounded by private property and the owner does not want heavy equipment in to possibly destroy the roadways to his mobile home park! Therefore the vines and overgrowth were terrible to hack back. My intentions are to go to the highway department and ask them to recommend the type of poison they use along the roadway to control the overgrowth so I can see about getting some of the same thing to spray all over the Horton site. Surely the DCPA has some connections that might help handle this problem.

Paul McLin (DCPA member) is on the board of the Oakland Cemetery and so is Dr. Charles Tandy. They are seriously involved in the care and maintenance of the site. Paul was able to cover the two cemetery tours last May after I had a stroke. He will probably lead the tour in May 2014 for the Dallas Historical Society, too. He knows lots of stories about our Pioneer forefathers!

The Handbook of Texas has a new section on line that is long overdue - African American! Dr. Marvin Dulaney History Professor is involved with this new enterprise. Black history has been neglected and research shows how important these early Dallas citizens were. So far many of the biographies are opening up much Dallas County History.
