SPEAKER - BERT N. SHIPP

Bert Shipp is a news-gathering legend. Known and loved throughout US media circles, he is truly one of a kind. His uniquely sharp wit, combined with his unparalleled fifty years of experience in Texas's radio, print and television industries, make him an incredible gift to all who know him.

As broadcast news came of age in the turbulent decades of the 1950's and 60's, North Texas reporter Bert Shipp was on the front line. While television changed the way Texas and the world witnessed history Shipp's DFW coverage reported stories of both national and local importance.

Marion Lee Halford, Sr. 1919-2012

Marion Lee Halford, Sr. died March 10, 2012 at age 92. Born to Marion Lafayette and Margaret Edmiston Halford on June 2, 1919 at the family farm in the Buckingham area of Richardson. Preceded in death by his wife of 59 years, Betsy; his brother, John, and his sisters, Mary and Catherine.

Graduated from Richardson High School in 1936. Received civil engineering degree from Southern Methodist University in 1942. Upon graduation, was commissioned as US Navy officer, serving during World War II in the Seabees, building air fields from islands in the South Pacific to Okinawa.

Following the war, returned to Richardson, building his first home on Spring Valley Road and joining the consulting engineering firm, Forrest and Cotton, where he was project engineer for the Trinity Industrial District and Industrial Properties Corporation, beginning a long association and friendship with John Stemmons. Joined Industrial Properties Corporation in 1966, retiring as president in 1990.

Among his community activities was service as a board member and chairman of the board of managers of Parkland Hospital; director of Dallas Chamber of Commerce; State Fair of Texas and Southwestern Medical Foundation. Long-time member of Rotary Club. Always an advocate for civil engineering school at SMU.

Enjoyed traveling, visiting all seven continents. Survived by son, Lee Halford, Jr., and his wife, Betsy, of Dallas; and daughter, Mary Margaret Bivings, and her husband, Bert, of Peachtree City, Georgia; six grand-children and five great grandchildren. The family thanks Karen McKenzie and Carol Miller, Lee's long-time caregivers.

A lot of activity concerning cemeteries and pioneer history in the county:

Sharrock/Niblo Cabin

Down Highway 67 Patriot Parkway (Spur 408) veers to the right at the intersection with Illinois. Going South you will soon see Grady Niblo exit. It takes a cautious driver to face the traffic, but stay on Grady Niblo past a new development, around a curve in the road; somewhere along here this road turns into Kiwanis Road. This is near Camp Wisdom Boy Scout Camp and the Girl Scout Camp Kiwanis!

In this area is where one of the original cabins and other buildings are remaining on the original site where they were built in the 1840's. Peters Colonist Everard Sharrock sold this land to go to California in 1853. Several others owned this site until the Niblo family bought it in 1934. They owned it until it was sold to the City of Dallas Park Department in 2005.

Thanks to Willis Winters with Dallas Park and Recreation Department, who loves preservation as much as we do and as money becomes available the cabin, barn, well, and other sections of the Everard Sharrock Jr.'s Farm will be restored. The structures are now covered with a large tarp, and braced from further deterioration and wind damage. This site is really a historic treasure!

Pet Memorial Cemetery

In Cedar Hill a Pet Cemetery, where beloved pets (dogs, cats and a few horses) had been buried for over 50 years, was abandoned by the owner and taxes had not been paid for several years. (While you are questioning taxes? cemeteries are exempt?? let me explain.)

Cemeteries for humans are tax exempt - but cemeteries for animals the land is not tax exempt! Due to the unpaid taxes Dallas County listed the cemetery site to be sold at auction from the Courthouse steps! A nonprofit group was quickly organized, a fund was raised and this group was high bidder. The person bidding against them did not know it was a pet cemetery. When he realized what was going on, he stopped bidding and later made a donation! They had raised enough money to pay off the unpaid taxes and are busy with arrangements to fence and level the property. They not only saved the site but will maintain it. They are currently getting a large marker and War Dogs who are allowed to come home with the troops will be given space for a dignified burial spot.

This Pet Cemetery was listed by the Texas Department of Transportation on the map I helped modify a few years ago as it is near Highway 67 in Cedar Hill. I delivered a copy of the map to the event that was involved with the fund for the War Dogs Memorial Marker. This area is full of Dallas County History!

Other Cemetery News

Missionary Baptist Church Cemetery on Haymarket Road near the Trinity River will be before the City Plan Commission soon as it is being presented as a Dallas landmark! The Free Will Baptist Church is gone but the cemetery containing the graves of the members, some thought to be freed slaves will be protected by this designation.

In Coppell the vacant land north of Belt Line on Denton Tap had been used for several things most recently it had been once used as a "trailer park." It is now being developed for a housing addition. This valuable land had been kept off the real estate market for many years. About 200 feet west of Denton Tap is the pioneer Bullock Cemetery with early Coppell families. Mary Evelelyn Cozby and her brother who was mayor of Coppell are buried here and had always protected the site when alive. In the past the city of Coppell, of all towns in Dallas County has been very careful when development encroached on cemetery sites. It is expected that will happen here, also.

On April 29, 2012 the cemetery long known as the Tornado Cemetery in Cedar Hill area is now recognized and has dedicated its Texas Historical Marker. Early history of Dallas County mentioned the 1856 tornado that wiped out the small village known as Cedar Hill. Mention was made of the victims in the newspapers of that day, but as time passed by the cemetery site was forgotten and practically lost. Wanda Pitt a member of the Cedar Hill Historical Society decided it was time to do something about this. She diligently searched and researched the Dallas County Deed Records, (some errors here, too) interviewed and read all articles she could find and finally discovered the actual remaining old fence, propped up by vines and trees of the Crawford Cemetery. This history is mentioned in Volume III of "Dallas County History from the Ground Up."


DCPA's "stuff."
