CEMETERIES OF DALLAS COUNTY

The American Memorial Cemetery in Grand Prairie has been sold and the new owners are going to apply for a Texas Historic Cemetery designation. The new name is Antioch Life Park Cemetery. It was established in 1881. DCPA member Charles Powers was friends with the previous owners and knows about this site from his years on the Grand Prairie City Council.

Several DCPA members attended the dedication of a Texas Historical Marker on April 7, 2018. Edward Mills (1805-1871) with his family came to Texas in 1847, and there were three sons Hope, John, and James who were also eligible for Peters Colony land. Altogether they had over 1600 acres in the Duck Creek area. The original cemetery site was set aside as a cemetery in the Will of Edward Mills that was probated in 1880. The first person buried here was Elizabeth Collins Mills in October 1854 The surrounding cemetery is known as the Garland Memorial Cemetery.

MORE INFO ON THE CEMETERIES OF DALLAS COUNTY

CEMETERY REPORT #5 - 4/13/2018 AND 4/19/2018

- 1. I drove by the location of the COATS-PASCHALL CEMETERY at 621 Pecan Creek Trail in Sunnyvale. Being on private property, I was not able to see the cemetery, but the Texas Historical Commission report says the Galloway's that own the land have started their own family cemetery adjacent to the Coats-Paschall Cemetery. Their cemetery is called FRANKLIN-GALLOWAY. They are very interested in cemetery preservation. I decided to drive by to make sure they haven't decided to sell. With the Historic Galloway House on the same property, I think the cemetery is in good hands.
- 2. The LONG CREEK CEMETERY at 504 Long Creek Road in Sunnyvale is still an active cemetery. It looked very nice and I think it has gotten bigger.
- 3. In Coppell, we found the BULLOCK CEMETERY at 151 Washington Court in very good condition. The cemetery really benefitted from the housing development. The Historical Marker is in place and the cemetery was full of beautiful yellow irises.
- 4. The MOORE CEMETERY at 525 Carter Dr. in Coppell looked good. It is supposed to be an active cemetery but we didn't see any recent activity. The entrance is between the houses at 516 and 524 Carter Dr. It was very easy to access. It has a nice fence but no identifying signs.
- 5. The HISTORIC BETHEL CEMETERY at 601 Christi Lane in Coppell is being well cared for. The Historical Marker is in place and the fence is in good shape.
- 6. The HISTORIC CARROLLTON BLACK CEMETERY at 1519 W. Belt Line Rd has also benefitted from construction in the area. It is located behind the Romco Equipment Co. When you pull into the drive you can go left or right around to the back of the building. The drive circles around the cemetery. There is a rock path to the fenced cemetery. There are three different Historical Markers. It will need to be mowed soon. The area around the cemetery has been mowed but not inside the fence.
- 7. The SNYDER-KENNEDY CEMETERY is located on Jackson Rd in Carrollton across Jackson Rd. from the Heritage Gardens Rehab & Healthcare at 2135 N Denton Dr. There are houses on 2 sides. The front and back are open to streets. There is a nice iron fence and a beautiful granite monument. Someone has tried to remove the gate but a heavy chain is keeping it at the cemetery.
- 8. The WARNER CEMETERY at 2610 Belmeade Dr. in Carrollton is in a nice neighborhood. The fence is in good shape. The grass needs to be mowed. There are a lot of headstones. Some have been broken and repaired. Some are broken and laid neatly on the ground.
- 9. The KEENAN FARMERS BRANCH CEMETERY at 2570 Valley View Ln is definitely an active cemetery. According to the Historical Marker, the Farmers Branch Keenan Cemetery Association has been maintaining this cemetery since 1938.

The Oldest Zoo in Texas

Dallas Zoo is a 106-acre zoo located 3 miles south of downtown Dallas, Texas, in Marsalis Park. Established in 1888, it is the oldest and largest zoological park in Texas and is managed by the non-profit Dallas Zoological Society. It is home to over 2,000 animals representing 406 species. It is an accredited member of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), and is a member of the World Association of Zoos and Aquariums (WAZA).

The zoo was established in 1888. The zoo's first purchase was two deer and two mountain lions for \$60 from a private seller in Colorado City, Colorado. The animals were placed in pens and put on display in City Park. In the 1890s, the Dallas City Council approved funding for the zoo and more animals were purchased and added to the zoo's collection. The zoo called City Park home until 1910, when it was relocated to Fair Park. In 1912, the zoo moved to 36 acres in Marsalis Park which the city had purchased in 1909, from which it has expanded to its current size. Under the leadership of Zoo Commissioner William H. Atwell, the zoo acquired many more animals as well as exhibits. In the 1920s, a special Zoo Commission was created by the city and the collection was further developed with the acquisition of numerous specimens from game hunter and trapper Frank Buck. In the Depression Era of the 1930s, the facilities at the zoo underwent extensive renovation funded by the Works Progress Administration.
